- (1) With reference to his reply to Question 177 on 20 March 2026 regarding a certain case (details furnished) involving SA Police Services (SAPS) members, (a) what is the current status of the investigation into the said case (details furnished), (b) what investigative steps remain outstanding, (c) what are the reasons the investigation has not yet been finalised and (d) what is the anticipated date for completion;
- (2) whether any performance, command or supervisory issues have been identified in relation to the handling of such a matter; if not, why not; if so, what corrective or disciplinary measures have been taken? CW479E

*Eskom accountability measures***426. Mr S A Zulu (Mpumalanga: MKP) to ask the Minister of Electricity and Energy:**

- (1) (a) What is the total verified quantum of funds and assets that were recovered to date in light of the arrest and ongoing investigation of a certain person (name furnished) in connection with large-scale procurement fraud at Eskom's Matla Power Station (details furnished) and (b) how will such recovered proceeds be (i) formally accounted for within Eskom's financial statement, (ii) ring-fenced and/or (iii) absorbed into general revenue;
- (2) what specific measures will his department implement to ensure that such recoveries translate into tangible financial relief for consumers, including the reduction or stabilisation of electricity tariffs given that households and businesses have already borne the burden of corruption through escalating tariffs and prolonged load shedding? With reference to the Threatened or Protected Species Regulations and the Draft Notice Prohibiting Certain Activities Involving African Lion which were unanimously approved by all provinces in the National Council of Province in March 2026, (a) when exactly such regulations and notice will be published in the Government Gazette to enable its implementation, (b) what steps have already been taken to finalise publication and (c) what the anticipated commencement date for implementation will be? *FILLER projects/programmes***429. Ms T Breedt (Free State: FF Plus) to ask the Minister of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment:**

- (1) (a) What is the current status of the (i) strategic priorities and (ii) associated projects and programmes of the Fair Industry for Lions, Leopards, Elephants and Rhinos (FILLER), (b) what measurable progress has been made in the implementation of the FILLER initiative since its launch, (c) what are the (i) key milestones, (ii) outcomes or (iii) achievements that have been recorded to date, (d) what challenges have been encountered and (e) how has his department addressed such challenges;
- (2) (a) what are the remaining (i) phases or (ii) projects under FILLER and (b) what are their expected completion timelines;
- (3) whether any progress reports or evaluations on FILLER programme have been tabled in Parliament or made publicly available; if not, why not in each case; if so, (a) what are their main (i) findings and (ii) recommendations and (b) what are the further relevant details? CW483E

*Progress of investigations***430. Ms T Breedt (Free State: FF Plus) to ask the Minister of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment:**

- (1) With reference to the reply to Question 310 by his predecessor on 3 April 2025, what progress has been made with the investigations that have been conducted by the SA National Parks (SANParks) together with the SA Police Service to apprehend perpetrators who are responsible for poisoning and snaring in the northern areas of the Kruger National Park;
- (2) whether he will now provide a specific reply to the survey (<https://ewt.org/lion-population-survey-kruger-decline/>) that has been referred to in the said question and in particular how he and SANParks will implement survey recommendation ‘that future conservation efforts are coupled with regular population monitoring in this

region to inform conservation actions and assess their effectiveness, taking an adaptive management approach'; if not, why not; if so, what are the relevant details;

- (3) whether any additional surveys on lions in the Kruger National Park have been conducted; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, what were the (a) key findings and (b) results of those surveys;
- (4) whether any lions have been reintroduced or translocated into the northern Kruger National Park from other parts of the Kruger National Park; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, (a) how many lions, (b) on what dates and (c) what has been the outcome of such reintroductions to date?

Whether she has been informed of the persistent maladministration, financial mismanagement and potential corruption in the utilisation of the Water Services Infrastructure Grant that has been allocated to the City of Matlosana Local Municipality; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, (a) what mechanisms are in place to detect such failures and (b) how her department accounts for the severe under-expenditure of the said allocated funds with only approximately R16.35 million of the R40 million transferred that was spent, leading to the withholding of a further R30 million as a result of non-performance?

Whether he has been informed that the City of Matlosana Local Municipality has collapsed into a cesspool of corruption, maladministration and reckless mismanagement of public funds as evidenced by gross under-expenditure of infrastructure grants, stalled projects at 0% progress and the continued failure to deliver basic water and sanitation services to the people; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, what immediate consequence management actions have been taken against corrupt and/or incompetent officials and political office bearers who are responsible for the said failure?

*Non-payment of PAYE by municipal councillors***434. Ms A M Siwisa (Northern Cape: EFF) to ask the Minister of Finance:**

What measures are in place to ensure that councillors in the Impendle Local Municipality in KwaZulu-Natal will not be subjected to any actions by the SA Revenue Services as a result of non-payment of their Pay As You Earn pertaining to such a municipality being dissolved in terms of section 139 (5)(b) of the Constitution (details furnished)? *Dissolution of Impendle LM***435. Ms A M Siwisa (Northern Cape: EFF) to ask the Minister of Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs:**

What interventions has his department embarked on before the decision to dissolve Impendle Local Municipality in KwaZulu-Natal in accordance with section 139 (5)(b) of the Constitution as the said municipality has been engulfed in non-spending of its grants? CW489E

*Construction of public library***436. Ms A M Siwisa (Northern Cape: EFF) to ask the Minister of Sport, Arts and Culture:**

When will the construction of a public library behind Vuyolwethu High School in Kimberley in the Sol Plaatjie Local Municipality in the Northern Cape be completed, taking into consideration that there is no library within the said township while students and learners have to rely on an internet café to access any information which is costly at times? *Lease agreement for permanent office***437. Mr M K Montwedi (North West: EFF) to ask the Minister of Public Works and Infrastructure:**

What are the causes of the prolonged delays in finalising the lease agreement for permanent office accommodation for the Department of Employment and Labour in Klerksdorp, given that the Petrus Cornelius Pelser Building was declared unsafe and prohibited for occupation, forcing the Labour Centre to operate from a municipal hall for nearly two years? *Animal identification system***438. Mr M K Montwedi (North West: EFF) to ask the Minister of Agriculture:**

Whether he intends to introduce legislation to amend the current animal identification system, including the Animal Identification Act, 2002 (Act No. 6 of 2002), to make participation in a compulsory national Livestock Identification and Traceability System (LITS) mandatory; if not, why not; if so, (a) when will such legislation be tabled in Parliament, and (b) what key changes are envisaged to ensure full livestock traceability? *Off-take agreements in poultry sector***439. Mr M K Montwedi (North West: EFF) to ask the Minister of Agriculture:**

Whether his department has facilitated and/or supported any off-take agreements in the poultry sector as part of the implementation of the Poultry Sector Master Plan during the last 12 months; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, (a) what agreements were concluded, (b) which parties are involved and (c) what volumes of locally produced poultry are covered?

- (2) whether his department has any programmes in place to skill the youth and/or youthful adult inmates to rehabilitate and release them as better and productive citizens; if not, why not; if so, what are the relevant details?

- (a) What remedial actions have he taken regarding the Matlosana Local Municipality that despite repeated section 139 interventions and concurrent functions with national and provincial departments continues to approve unfunded budgets and fails to monitor expenditure patterns on unfinished roads, sewerage and storm water projects and (b) what remedial measures will be taken to ensure (i) standardised services and (ii) constitutional compliance in human settlements delivery?

*Blacklisting/sanctioning of contractors***443. Mr K Ceza (Mpumalanga: EFF) to ask the Minister of Human Settlements:**

Whether she will blacklist or sanction any contractors who have (a) abandoned sites after building only a fraction of allocated houses between 2014 and 2026, (b) handed over defective units without bulk services and (c) exposed communities to crime and fatalities, including the

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reported child death as a result of unsafe construction spaces; if not, why not; if so, (i) what timelines exist for enforcement and accountability and (ii) what are the further relevant details? CW497E

Funds allocated to human settlements projects

444. Mr K Ceza (Mpumalanga: EFF) to ask the Minister of Human Settlements:

- (1) Whether she will account for the R900 million that was allocated to human settlements projects in the Matlosana Local Municipality, given the persistent leaks, asbestos backlogs, inadequate planning and failure to provide value for money; if not, why not; if so, what are the relevant details;
- (2) (a) what punitive actions will her department put in place for the provincial department for misleading the Select Committee on Cooperative Governance and Public Administration regarding sewer projects that are supposedly been completed in March 2026 and (b) what national interventions will be instituted to ensure that sustainable human settlements norms and standards are met? CW498E

Agreements between TVET colleges/universities

445. Ms M Kennedy (Limpopo: EFF) to ask the Minister of Higher Education:

What steps are being taken to strengthen articulation agreements between Technical and Vocational Education and Training colleges and universities that are allowing students to bridge from a diploma to a degree? CW499E

Establishing new universities

446. Ms M Kennedy (Limpopo: EFF) to ask the Minister of Higher Education:

What is the long-term, multi-year plan for establishing new universities or expanding existing satellite campuses in the rural areas since the number of matriculants are growing while no new traditional universities are being built? CW500E

Corporal punishment in schools

447. Mr M M Mampuru (Gauteng: EFF) to ask the Minister of Basic Education:

Whether she has been informed of any allegations that some schools continue to use corporal punishment as a form of disciplining learners despite it being outlawed; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, (a) how many cases of corporal punishment have been reported to her department in each province over the past three financial years and (b) what are the further relevant details? Increase in xenophobia-related violence**448. Mr M M Mampuru (Gauteng: EFF) to ask the Acting Minister of Police:**

Whether he has been informed of the recent increase in xenophobia-related violence, particularly incidents directed at African foreign nationals where individuals have been seen assaulting civilians and damaging private and public property; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, (a) what interventions have been implemented to prevent and quell such a violence and (b) what are the further relevant details? Issuing of operating permits**449. Mr M M Mampuru (Gauteng: EFF) to ask the Minister of Transport:**

Whether she has been informed of any allegations by e-hailing drivers that her department together with municipalities and traditional taxi operators are deliberately delaying the issuing of operating permits to e-hailing operators, resulting in their vehicles being impounded and their businesses being disrupted; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, (a) what measures are being implemented to ensure the safety and protection of such operators, particularly in areas where they face threats, intimidation or violence from traditional taxi operators and (b) what are the further relevant details? Police station built on sewage plant**450. Ms A Matshobeni (Eastern Cape: EFF) to ask the Acting Minister of Police:**

Whether he has been informed of the Suncity Police Station in Sun Village in the North West that was built on a sewage plant; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, (a) what actions has his department taken to address the (i) sewage problem and (ii) health risk which the police members are exposed to and (b) what are the further relevant details? CTCT operational staff**451. Mr F J Badenhorst (Western Cape: DA) to ask the Minister of Transport:**

- (1) (a) How many operational staff were assigned to the Cape Town Container Terminal (CTCT) during the November 2025 to February 2026 peak export season, (b) how many (i) permanent employees, (ii) temporary and/or (iii) contract staff, (c) how many additional staff were deployed during the said season as compared to the normal operational complement, (d) what was the total number of man-hours lost as a result of staff (i) absenteeism, (ii) sick leave and/or (iii) unplanned leave at CTCT during such period and (e) what percentage of the scheduled workforce was absent during peak operational shifts;
- (2) whether any critical operational personnel, including crane operators, technical specialists, planners and/or shift supervisors were on planned leave during the said peak export period; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, (a) how many in each category and (b) what mitigation measures were implemented;

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- (3) (a) how many operational hours were lost while equipment and/or berths could not be utilised as a result of staff shortages and/or lack of qualified operators, (b) what steps is Transnet taking to improve staff availability and operational staffing levels during such peak export seasons and (c) what plans are in place to address (i) skills shortages, (ii) ageing workforce concerns and (iii) succession planning within terminal operations?

- (a) How many reefer plug points are currently installed at the Cape Town Container Terminal, (b) how many in each reefer stack area and operational yard zones, (c) what is the maximum reefer container capacity that CTCT could accommodate simultaneously, (d) how many additional reefer plug points were installed and/or sponsored by third parties and/or industry partners in the past five years, (e) how many reefer plug points were (i) operational and (ii) out of service during the November 2025 to February 2026 season, (f) what were the reasons for the outages if any plug points were not operational during the said peak export season, (g) why were they not repaired prior to the start of the peak export season and (h) what plans and timelines are in place to upgrade and/or expand reefer capacity at CTCT to support growth in refrigerated agricultural exports?

453. Mr F J Badenhorst (Western Cape: DA) to ask the Minister of Transport:

- (1) (a) What is the total number of operational container handling equipment units that are currently deployed at the Cape Town Container Terminal (CTCT), including (i) ship-to-shore cranes, (ii) rubber-tyred gantry (RTG) cranes and (iii) other yard handling equipment, (b) how many operational hours were lost as a result of equipment breakdowns and/or mechanical failures at CTCT during the November 2025 to February 2026 peak season for the said categories and (c) what percentage of the terminal's equipment fleet was unavailable as a result of the breakdowns during the said period;
- (2) whether CTCT maintains a permanent 24-hour maintenance team on site; if not, (a) what maintenance arrangements are currently in place to address equipment failures and (b) what is the average response time to equipment breakdowns at CTCT; if so, what are the relevant details;
- (3) whether (a) all operators were fully trained before deployment, given the newly procured equipment that was introduced at CTCT, including rubber-tyred gantry cranes and (b) the required personal protective equipment (PPE) and safety protocols were implemented to allow safe operation under higher wind conditions; if not, why not in each case; if so, what are the relevant details;
- (4) (a) how many of the 28 new RTGs are currently operational that were purchased and commissioned, (b) how many are consistently manned in each shift, (c) what was the

originally planned number of RTGs to be deployed and manned, (d) how many will be deployed and (e) why such has been adjusted;

- (5) (a) what has been the total downtime in hours that are attributable to breakdowns and/or underperformance of the new RTGs since their deployment in September 2025, (b) how is reliability and performance of the new RTG fleet compared to older equipment over the same period, (c) who is responsible for maintenance of RTG fleet, (d) to what extent have spare parts availability and/or maintenance capacity constraints contributed to downtime and (e) what interventions are being planned to improve reliability, utilisation and performance of the said fleet? Deployment of SANDF in Cape Flats

454. Mr N Gotsell (Western Cape: DA) to ask the Minister of Defence and Military Veterans:

- (1) Whether approximately 800 members of the SA National Defence Force (SANDF) were deployed to the Cape Flats in support of the SA Police Service under Operation Prosper as it was reported in the joint meeting of the Joint Standing Committee on Defence, Portfolio Committee on Police and the Select Committee on Security and Justice that was held on 23 March 2026; if not, why not, if so, what are the relevant details;
- (2) whether approximately 200 SANDF members are currently deployed across the Cape Flats as off to date; if not, what are the exact current deployment numbers; if so, what are the reasons for the full complement of troops referred to in subparagraph (1) has not yet been deployed;
- (3) whether the delays in deploying the full complement is attributable to a shortage of available troops, logistical and/or operational constraints, funding and/or resource limitations, incomplete training or readiness requirements and/or any other factors; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, what are the relevant details in each case;
- (4) whether the SANDF and her department were operationally ready to deploy the full complement of troops at the time of assurances to the said meeting in Parliament; if not, why such assurances were made; if so, (a) what evidence supports such a position, (b) on what date the full complement of the SANDF members initially communicated to Parliament be fully deployed to the Cape Flats and (c) what are the exact daily deployment figures of SANDF members are assigned to each police station and/or operational area in the Cape Flats from 1 April 2026 up to and including the date of receipt of this question;
- (5) whether she will provide documentary evidence of the operational readiness assessments, mobilisation orders and deployment instructions that are relied upon when informing Parliament that the SANDF was ready to deploy; if not, why not; if so, what are the relevant details? CW508E

*Operational deployment under Operation Prosper***455. Mr N Gotsell (Western Cape: DA) to ask the Acting Minister of Police:**

- (1) Whether a certain Lieutenant General (details furnished), Deputy National Commissioner of the SA Police Service (SAPS) confirmed that the operational deployment under Operation Prosper would be executed on the basis of a ratio of two SAPS members to one member of the SA National Defence Force (SANDF); if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, what are the relevant details;
- (2) whether the recorded deployment instructions and operational presence in respect of the 17 hotspot police station areas in the Cape Town Metropole as at 17 April 2026 could not adhere to the aforesaid ratio; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, (a) on what factual basis he contends that the ratio was complied with and (b) what were the exact daily deployment numbers and ratios of the (i) SAPS members and (ii) SANDF members assigned to each police station in the Cape Town Metropole for every day from 1 April 2026 up to and including the date of receipt of this question;
- (3) whether there were any days during the aforesaid period on which the ratio of the two SAPS members to one SANDF member was not adhered to; if not, (a) why not, (b) what evidence supports such assertion, (c) what was the ratio for each station and (d) what were the reasons for the deviation; if so, (i) what operational successes were recorded during the aforesaid period at each police station, (ii) what was the nature of the operation and (iii) what was the outcome, including effected arrests, seized firearms and ammunition, confiscated drugs and detected gang-related offences;
- (4) (a) how many of the referred successes in subparagraph (3) have resulted in (i) prosecutions and (ii) matters being enrolled on court rolls and (b) what are the Crime Administration System numbers that are associated with each of the said referred cases in subparagraph (3);
- (5) whether he will provide documentary proof of operational deployment instructions that have been issued to each station commander for the period from 1 April 2026 to the date of receipt of this question; if not, why not; if so, what are the relevant details?

*Functionality of Table View Police Station***456. Mr N Gotsell (Western Cape: DA) to ask the Acting Minister of Police:**

- (1) Whether, with reference to his reply to Question 1018 on 22 August 2025 in which he stated that members of the public in the Parklands area continued to receive policing services from the nearby and “fully functional” Table View Police Station, the Table View Police Station is fully functional as stated in his reply; if not, why not; if so, what is the current population that is served by the said police station precinct;
- (2) (a) what specific geographic areas and communities fall under the jurisdiction of the Table View Police Station, (b) what population projections have been used by the SA Police Service (SAPS) over the past five years to determine the adequacy of policing

- resources for this precinct, (c) what is the current fixed establishment of such police station for each (i) rank and (ii) function, (d) how many posts are currently vacant at the said station, (e) how many members are currently unavailable for operational duties as a result of suspension, training, sick leave and/or other administrative reasons and (f) what is the current ratio of police officers to the population served by the station;
- (3) (a) what is the total number of vehicles allocated to the Table View Police Station, (b) how many of such vehicles are currently non-operational and/or awaiting repairs, (c) what specialised resources and operational capacity are allocated to address coastal and marine-related crime, given the extensive coastline within the jurisdiction of the said police station, (d) what strategy has been implemented by the SAPS to address the presence of organised criminal networks and drug syndicates that are operating in Parklands and the surrounding areas and (e) what dedicated personnel, units and investigative resources are allocated specifically to Parklands;
- (4) (a) what are the recorded annual statistics for murder, attempted murder, rape, theft and firearm-related offences in the Table View Police Station precinct for each of the past five financial years and (b) how many criminal cases that are emanating from the said police station were withdrawn or struck off the court roll in each of the past five financial years as a result of insufficient evidence and/or investigative shortcomings attributable to resource constraints?

Domestication of Bunker Convention

457. Dr I S Scheurkogel (Free State: DA) to ask the Minister of Transport:

- (1) (a) What is her department's current position and timeline for the domestication of the Bunker Convention into a South African legislation, given the significant gaps in the compensation framework for bunker oil pollution damage, (b) what inter-departmental consultations have taken place and/or are being planned with the Department of Forestry, Fisheries and Environment and the Department of Justice and Constitutional Development regarding such domestication process, and (c) how her department intends to address the fault-based liability system shortfalls of the existing Marine Pollution (Control and Civil Liability), 1981 (Act No. 6 of 1981), through domestication (details furnished);
- (2) whether her department supports replacing the fault-based system with strict liability and introducing joint and several liability for multi-vessel incidents in line with what the Bunker Convention provides; if not, why not; if so,
- (3) whether her department supports expanding the definition of "pollution damage" to cover ecological harm, psychosocial harm and cumulative and latent impacts; if not, why not; if so, how her department proposes to address the absence of mandatory insurance requirements for bunkering vessels and the capping of liability under the current framework so that it aligns with the polluter pay principle (details furnished);
- (4) whether her department agrees that domestication of the Bunker Convention must align with the principles of the National Environmental Management, 1998 (Act No.

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107 of 1998), including the integrated environmental management (details furnished); if so, (a) what provisions will be included to have effect on such, (b) how her department proposes to provide direct cost-recovery mechanisms to organs of state and non-governmental organisations such as Southern African Foundation for the Conservation of Coastal Birds that incur rehabilitation and cleanup costs following oil spills, given that no such statutory mechanism currently exists following the four spills that have occurred in Algoa Bay since bunkering started in 2016 and (c) what recourse affected communities, government entities and wildlife habitation organisations have under the current framework;

- (5) whether any compensations and/or cost recoveries were successfully obtained; if not, why not; if so, what are the relevant details? CW511E

Domestication of Bunker Convention

458. Dr I S Scheurkogel (Free State: DA) to ask the Minister of Transport:

- (1) On what evidential basis her department supports the lifting of the moratorium, given the moratorium on bunkering in Algoa Bay which was imposed in 2019 and lifted in early 2024 and her department's support for the resumption of bunkering operations;
