 - (1) notes with great sadness the passing on of former President of Zimbabwe, Mr Robert Gabriel Mugabe, in a hospital in Singapore on Friday morning, 6 September 2019, at the age of 95;
 - (2) recalls that the one-time school teacher was a leading political driver of the 1970s independence war that ended white-minority rule in Zimbabwe;
 - (3) acknowledges that he is an icon of liberation, a pan-Africanist who dedicated his life to the emancipation and empowerment of his people;
 - (4) understands that after leaving then Fort Hare University where he was introduced to politics, he founded the ZANU party in 1963 and was jailed the same year for calling for the violent overthrow of Ian Smith's white-minority government;
 - (5) believes that his contribution to the history of Zimbabwe and the African continent will never be forgotten; and
 - (6) conveys its condolences to his wife Grace Mugabe, family and the people of Zimbabwe.

20. Draft resolution (Mr N S Matiase): That the House –
 - (1) notes on 6 September 2019, one of the most visionary and the bravest of leaders produced by the African anti-colonial liberation

movement, Mr Robert Gabriel Mugabe, the former President of Zimbabwe, passed on;

- (2) further notes that President Robert Mugabe was a devoted Pan-Africanist, a principled revolutionary, with unwavering commitment to the cause for the liberation of Africa and development of the African continent in a manner that puts African people first;
- (3) acknowledges that he stands head and shoulders above the rest in his commitment to resolve the timeless question of the return of African land back to African people, of the use of African wealth for the development of Africa;
- (4) realises that the Fast Track Land Reform Programme in Zimbabwe remains a lodestar for all those still fighting for the return of the land;
- (5) further acknowledges that in his lifetime, he faced unimaginable attacks in the quest for the return of the land to African people, and that Zimbabwe was punished for daring to redefine itself as a sovereign nation; and
- (6) sends its condolences to the family of Robert Mugabe and to the people of Zimbabwe for whom Mugabe gave all his life.

21. Draft resolution (Ms A Gela): That the House –

- (1) notes that black farmers in Rethuseng in Taung are operating in an area of 1 054 hectares under sprinkler irrigation without water supply or any support from government;
- (2) acknowledges that black farmers contribute to food security, and without water, their barley and wheat plantation will be a failed exercise;
- (3) recognises that they rely on old infrastructure that has not been maintained and continue to dilapidate because of neglect;
- (4) further recognises that government has failed to revitalise irrigation schemes all over the country and this has affected food security;
- (5) understands that land reform failed because black farmers are given land without necessary support of fertilizers, tools, tractors and marketing and distribution of their produce; and
- (6) refers this matter to the Portfolio Committee on Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development together with the Portfolio Committee on Human Settlement, Water and Sanitation to investigate the scale of failing irrigation schemes due to lack of water and a clear programme of what is to be done.

- (3) further acknowledges that this theme is based on aspirations of the 6th Administration as pronounced by His Excellency President Ramaphosa during his State of the Nation Address;
- (4) recognises that this integration brings together the triple celebrations of Heritage, the Environment, and Tourism, since all these fall within the September month; and
- (5) calls on all citizens to participate in these celebrations.
