### *Vrede housing project*

**335. Mr B A Radebe (Free State: ANC) to ask the Minister of Human Settlements:**

- (1) Whether she has been informed of a certain contractor's (details furnished) flagrant disregard for the Public Finance Management Act, 1999 (Act No. 1 of 1999), and the Preferential Procurement Regulations of 2017, given that the said contractor appointed by the Free State Department of Human Settlements ceded the entire work of building and completing 242 houses in Vrede to subcontractors without paying them (details furnished); if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, what steps will she take to ensure that subcontractors receive payment for work they have conducted;
- (2) whether the contractor will be blacklisted and reported to law enforcement agencies and its contract be terminated if it ceded all the work to subcontractors; if not, why not; if so, (a) how is the monitoring and evaluation of such a project conducted by her department, (b) how much was paid to the said contractor and (c) what are the further relevant details;
- (3) whether there is any project steering committee for the Vrede housing project; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, what are the relevant details;
- (4) whether (a) her department paid a site establishment fee to the contractor as the entire work was ceded to subcontractors and (b) the paid amount accurately matches the work conducted; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, what are the relevant details;
- (5) whether her department has any legal relationships regarding housing projects with Tennessee in the United States; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, what are the relevant details?

- (2) whether the said company received full payment for work completed on the R40 Swartfontein between Hazyview and White River; if not, (a) what is the position in this regard, (b) what is the outstanding scope of work required from the said company to complete the original contract and (c) what is the Bill of Quantities for the outstanding work; if so, what are the relevant details;
- (3) (a) what is the SA National Roads Agency Limited's (Sanral) final documented conclusion on the cause of the road slide following the January 2026 rains that resulted in requiring an additional six months of repairs, (b) which engineers (i) authored and/or (ii) signed off on the report, (c) what is the (i) scope of work and (ii) Bill of Quantities for the repairs that Sanral has undertaken on the failed section of the road, (d) what are the reasons that Sanral has elected to undertake the repairs to the rain-damaged area itself rather than procuring the work through a tender process and (e) who is responsible for the maintenance of the bypass road, given that it is currently almost inaccessible as a result of potholes? - (1) Whether, with reference to his reply to Question 1091 on 17 September 2025, he will provide an updated detailed record of each Human-Elephant Conflict (HEC) incident within the South African borders from 28 August 2025 up to the latest specified date for which information is available; if not, why not; if so, (a) what is the (i) date, (ii) location and (iii) nature of each incident, (b) what is the type of damage and/or threat that has been caused and (c) what are the reasons for the presence of elephants in the affected area;
- (2) whether any loss of (a) human and/or (b) elephant lives have been reported in this regard; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, what actions have been taken by authorities to (i) address such conflicts and (ii) mitigate future risks;
- (3) whether any efforts have been made to consolidate or synthesise provincial-level reports and data on HEC into a single overarching national report, database or overview; if not, why not; if so, (a) what are the key findings or recommendations from such a report, (b) where was it published, (c) where could it be accessed and (d) what are the relevant details regarding the abovementioned criteria? *Human-Elephant Conflict evaluations***338. Ms T Breedt (Free State: FF Plus) to ask the Minister of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment:**

- (1) With reference to his reply to Question 1265 on 24 October 2025 regarding Human-Elephant Conflict (HEC) evaluations, data management and absence of the national coordination, (a) what is the current implementation status of the Global Environment Facility (GEF)-7 project 'Reducing Human-Wildlife Conflict through an Evidence-based and Integrated Approach in Southern Africa', (b) when will the project (i) quantify HEC incidences and impacts nationwide, (ii) evaluate the efficacy of mitigation measures and (iii) finalise the National Policy on Human-Wildlife Conflict Management, (c) what is the total project budget for South Africa in (i) GEF funding, (ii) departmental budget contributions, (iii) provincial budget and (iv) any private partnership contributions for the 2025/26 and 2026/27 financial years and (d) when will an interim progress report, including pilot results from the identified hotspots be made available to Parliament and the public;
- (2) (a) how many provinces submitted HEC incident data using his department's new reporting template since October 2025, (b) which provinces remain non-compliant and (c) what concrete enforcement steps his department has taken to compel submission of the outstanding five-year data;
- (3) what interim measures has his department implemented to (a) identify current HEC hotspots and trends and (b) assess the effectiveness of existing mitigation measures in communities that are bordering Kruger National Park and other protected areas since October 2025 in the complete absence of formal evaluations and a functional national HEC database;
- (4) whether his department has any plans to establish a dedicated national Human-Wildlife Conflict coordination unit; if not, why not; if so, (a) what plans, (b) when, (c) what will its (i) mandate and (ii) resourcing include and (d) what are the further relevant details?

- (a) How much has been allocated to support the implementation of the National Drug Master Plan, (b) how is such funding distributed across national, provincial and local levels and (c) how is his department ensuring that the said programme is appropriately prioritised, given that this matter is a national crisis? *Underperformance at Cape Town Container Terminal***343. Mr H J Van den Berg (Northern Cape: FF Plus) to ask the Minister of Transport:**

- (1) Whether her department and Transnet has engaged with the Department of Agriculture and a certain company (details furnished) regarding the sustained underperformance at the Cape Town Container Terminal (CTCT) during the 2025/26 deciduous fruit export season which has already caused direct losses that are exceeding R350 million to fruit producers; if not, why not; if so, (a) what are the outcomes of such engagements and (b) what are the further relevant details;
- (2) (a) what is the total amount Transnet has spent on (i) legal costs, (ii) settlements and (iii) related litigation expenses arising from port delays, equipment failures, operational incompetence and resulting damages that have been claimed by farmers,

fruit exporters and other clients in the (aa) 2023/24, (bb) 2024/25 and (cc) 2025/26 financial years and (b) what is the breakdown of the said costs for each commercial harbour;

- (3) what specific time-bound structural reforms is her department implementing at the CTCT to address the documented shortcomings in (a) labour management, (b) equipment reliability, (c) operational controls, (d) crane productivity and (e) accountability that has led to vessel delays, quality claims, diversion costs and reputational damage for South African harbours and fruit exporters, given that Cape Town's Container Port Performance Index score improved, but port remains among the worst-performance globally;
- (4) (a) how her department reconciles the recent public-private partnership at the Durban Container Terminal Pier 2 with the International Container Terminal Services Incorporation and the resultant improvements in Durban with the continued crisis at Cape Town and (b) what concrete steps, including (i) greater private-sector operational involvement and (ii) measurable executive accountability will be taken to prevent new export opportunities such as the landmark stone-fruit agreement with China from being undermined by unreliable port logistics? ***Sustained underperformance at CTCT***

**344. Mr H J Van den Berg (Northern Cape: FF Plus) to ask the Minister of Agriculture:**

- (1) Whether, with reference to reports that the deciduous fruit industry represented by a certain company (details furnished) has incurred direct losses that is exceeding R350 million as a result of vessel delays, low crane productivity, equipment failures and related logistical disruptions, his department has engaged with the Department of Transport and Transnet regarding their sustained underperformance at the Cape Town Container Terminal (CTCT) during the 2025/26 deciduous fruit export season; if not, why not; if so, what are the (a) relevant details and (b) outcomes of such engagements;
- (2) what steps has his department taken to (a) pressure Transnet and the Department of Transport for urgent structural reforms at the South African ports and (b) mitigate the impact on fruit exporters and rural economies;
- (3) whether his department has considered or is supporting any coordinated expert-led transformation programme at the CTCT that is involving measurable commitments, strong executive accountability and greater private-sector operational involvement as called by the said company; if not, why not; if so, what are the relevant details;
- (4) (a) how his department reconciles the recent opening of the Chinese market for South African stone fruit and dispatch of the first plum shipments with the ongoing risk that new export opportunities are undermined by unreliable port logistics and (b) what concrete time-bound actions will his department implement to ensure that market-access gains translate into actual revenue for producers? *Fencing around Kruger National Park***345. Mr H J Van den Berg (Northern Cape: FF Plus) to ask the Minister of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment:**

- (1) With reference to his reply to Question 1264 on 24 October 2025, (a) what is the total length of fencing around the Kruger National Park that is classified as (i) good, (ii) fair, (iii) poor and (iv) absent/non-existent or removed to allow animal migration into Mozambique for the 2025/26 financial year and (b) how many kilometres of fence has been (i) repaired, (ii) reinforced or (iii) newly installed in each provincial boundary section in each of the past three financial year;
- (2) (a) what the specific non-lethal interventions are currently being implemented or piloted, (b) what priority hotspots have been identified through the ongoing evaluations, (c) what measurable targets are in place (d) what key performance indicators for reducing breakout incidents and crop damage over the next 24 months regarding the phased approach and adaptive operational plan for managing human-elephant conflict in the said park are, (e) what is the total budgeted allocation for such measures in the (i) 2025/26 and (ii) 2026/27 financial years, (f) what are his department's contribution and amounts from partner entities and (g)(i) when and (ii) how will a publicly available progress report on such a phased approach be shared with the public and/or Parliament;
- (3) whether his department has considered amending the national legislation and regulations, including the Threatened or Protected Species Regulations 2007 or the Elephant Norms and Standards to introduce a mandatory hierarchy of mitigation measures and non-lethal before lethal and damage-causing elephant may be destroyed; if not, why not; if so, (a) what are the timelines in this regard and (b) what are the further relevant details;
- (4) (a) how the current approach to damage-causing elephants aligns with (i) the emerging National Elephant Heritage Strategy and (ii) any related human-wildlife conflict pilots being funded under international programmes and (b) what role will community consultation and benefit-sharing play in finalising and implementing such frameworks?

*Convictions of common/statutory law***346. Mr N Gotsell (Western Cape: DA) to ask the Acting Minister of Police:**

- (1) How many SA Police Service (SAPS) members have been convicted of any common and/or statutory law in the Western Cape since 1 November 2016, given Regulation 5(3)(dd) of the SAPS Discipline Regulations 2016 which provides that an employee is guilty of misconduct when convicted of any common and/or statutory law offence;
- (2) whether he will provide full particulars of each member, including full names, ranks, force numbers, stations, units and/or components in each such case; if not; why not; if so, what are the relevant details;

- (3) whether the said members (a) remained operationally deployed after the conviction and (b) are still in the employment of the SAPS; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, what are the relevant details;
- (4) what were the full details of criminal charge(s), arrest dates, case numbers, courts in which the matter was heard, conviction dates, offences of which members were convicted and the imposed sentences in each case;
- (5) whether Regulation 5(3)(dd) was invoked in each case; if not, (a) why not, (b) what alternative disciplinary provisions were relied upon in each case where regulation 5(3)(dd) was not applied and (c) what is his explanation for not proceeding under the specific regulation that deals with the conviction of a common law and/or statutory offence; if so, (i) when, (ii) by whom was the decision taken, (iii) what disciplinary charges were formulated, (iv) what were the outcomes of such disciplinary processes and (v) what sanctions were imposed? ***Criminal case against SAPS member***

**347. Mr N Gotsell (Western Cape: DA) to ask the Acting Minister of Police:**

- (1) (a) On what date was the SA Police Service (SAPS) first informed of the (i) complaint and/or criminal case against a certain captain (details furnished) of the Western Cape regarding his reportedly sentence to six months imprisonment and/or a fine of R1000 wholly suspended for assault with intent to do grievous bodily harm arising from an incident on 3 November 2024 and (ii) conviction and sentence and (b) when was the matter referred for internal disciplinary processes;
- (2) whether Regulation 5(3)(dd) was applied in such a case; if not, why not; if so, (a) what is the full timeline of the disciplinary process from referral to finalisation, (b) what are dates of the notice, (c) what are the details of suspensions and any hearings, (d) what are the findings and sanctions and (e) what was the final disciplinary outcome;
- (3) whether the said person remains a member of the SAPS; if not; what is the position in this regard; if so, (a) in what capacity and (b) at which (i) station, (ii) unit and/or (iii) component;
- (4) whether the SAPS has any standing national and/or provincial instruction that regulates internal disciplinary handling of members who are convicted of criminal offences; if not, why not; if so, what are the relevant details? CW401E

***Funding Operation Prosper***

**348. Mr N Gotsell (Western Cape: DA) to ask the Minister of Finance:**

- (1) Whether section 16 of the Public Finance Management Act, 1999 (Act No. 1 of 1999), which provides for the use of funds in emergency situations has been invoked and/or intended to be invoked to fund Operation Prosper in terms of the President's letter of employment for members of the SA National Defence Force (SANDF) in cooperation



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with the SA Police Service (SAPS) as signed on 11 March 2026; if not, what is the position in this regard; if so, (a) when was such authorisation granted and (b) how much has been authorised in terms of section 16 of the said Act;

- (2) whether he has received a detailed breakdown of the expected expenditure of R823 153 960.00 referred to in the said letter of employment from the Department of Defence and Military Veterans; if not; what is the position in this regard; if so, what are the relevant details;
- (3) whether the required report to Parliament and the Auditor-General in terms of section 16(4) and (5) has been submitted within the prescribed timeframes; if not, why not; if so, what specific budget votes, programmes and/or line items have been reprioritised and/or deferred to fund the deployment pending the next adjustments budget;
- (4) whether his department imposed any conditions, controls and/or reporting requirements to ensure compliance with the principles of transparency, accountability and value for money; if not, why not; if so, what proactive financial oversight and/or risk mitigation measures have been implemented by the National Treasury in light of the ongoing investigations by the Special Investigating Unit and the Directorate for Priority Crime Investigation into departments within the security cluster to ensure that expenditure that is related to Operation Prosper would not contribute to corruption, irregular expenditure and/or financial mismanagement? ***Funding of SANDF/SAPS deployment***

- (1) (a) Which specific programmes, sub-programmes and/or line items within her department have been reprioritised, deferred and/or reduced to fund the deployment in the interim, given the employment of members of the SA National Defence Force (SANDF) in cooperation with the SA Police Service under Operation Prosper as authorised in the President's letter of employment that was signed on 11 March 2026 (details furnished) and (b) what impact such reprioritisation has been expected to have on the operational readiness, maintenance of equipment and infrastructure, training exercises and other planned activities within the SANDF;
- (b) whether any risk assessments were conducted prior to the announcement of such deployment regarding financial and operational consequences of funding the said deployment through internal reprioritisation; if not, why not; if so, what are the relevant details? CW403E

***Expenditures for Operation Prosper***

**350. Mr M Billy (KwaZulu-Natal: DA) to ask the Minister of Defence and Military Veterans:**

- (1) Whether her department provided the National Treasury with a detailed and itemised breakdown of the expected expenditure of the R823 153 960.00 as referred to in the President's letter of employment prior to the announcement of the deployment of the

National Defence Force (SANDF) in cooperation with the South African Police Service (SAPS) under Operation Prosper; if not, why not; if so, (a) when has her department first determined the estimated cost of the said amount and (b) what methodology was utilised to calculate it;

- (2) whether her department has enhanced any financial controls, monitoring mechanisms or reporting requirements to ensure that funds allocated to Operation Prosper are spent strictly for their intended purpose; if not, why not; if so, what are the relevant details;
- (3) what steps have been taken to ensure that funding and implementation of Operation Prosper would not compromise her department's core defence mandate and/or expose her department to further instances of financial mismanagement, given its current financial pressure and the ongoing investigations into corruption and irregular expenditure?

- (1) (a) How many registered private security companies are operating in KwaZulu-Natal (KZN) in terms of compliance monitoring and enforcement within the private security industry, (b) how many are currently active, (c) how many have been inspected and/or audited by the SA Police Service (SAPS), either independently and/or in collaboration with the Private Security Industry Regulatory Authority (PSIRA) in each of the past three financial years, (d) what were the findings of such inspections in respect of non-compliance, including but not limited to firearm licensing irregularities, non-compliance with PSIRA registration requirements, improper record-keeping of firearms and ammunition and employment of unregistered or untrained personnel, (e) how many companies were found to be non-compliant in each category and (f) what actions have been taken by the SAPS and/or PSIRA against non-compliant security companies in KZN during the same period, including the number of companies that have been issued with compliance notice, suspended and/or closed, arrests made and the total value of fines and/or penalties imposed;
- (2) whether his department has any plans to implement a province-wide compliance audit and/or enforcement programme that is targeting private security companies in KZN; if not, why not; if so, what are the relevant details?

- (2) (a) what policies, systems and standard operating procedures govern the use of personal information, images and success stories in youth enterprise development programmes, (b) how her department ensures that implementation partners comply with data governance, record-keeping and consent verification requirements and (c) what remedial processes are available when individuals dispute their inclusion as beneficiaries?

- (3) (a) what integrated case management and/or escalation mechanisms are in place to ensure that applicants for youth economic support are not subjected to administrative fragmentation, given the repeated reports of individuals being referred between multiple departments and/or programmes without resolution, (b) how many cases have been formally escalated through such mechanisms in the past three financial years and (c) what proportion of such cases have resulted in successful resolution with measurable economic outcomes?

- (3) (a) what is the name of the contractor that has been appointed to draft the SDF for the said municipality, (b) what are the full business details and (c) what is the total contract value in rands?

- (4) whether the SAPS obtained precise notification records, including call logs, occurrence book entries and radio communications; if not, why not; if so,
- (5) whether any officials were interviewed under caution regarding such delays, failure to preserve the crime scene or handling of evidence; if not, why not; if so, what are the relevant details?
