 - (1) notes that a baby died at Mafikeng Provincial Hospital from burn wounds because of a warmer;

- (2) further notes that South Africa's public health care system has completely collapsed and is responsible for many deaths that are preventable;
- (3) realises that women and children are harmed on a daily basis as a result of the violence perpetrated by men, only to go to hospitals to die because of carelessness;
- (4) understands that no one is held accountable; the hospital is not taking responsibility and the family is left with a terrible loss that is not explained;
- (5) sends its heartfelt condolences to Kelebogile Emily Kerileng for the loss of her baby; and
- (6) commits to look at the work of the executive, and do oversight on the programmes meant to prevent unnecessary loss of life in our hospitals.

17. Draft resolution (Mr N Capa): That the House –

- (1) celebrates the strides made by women in agriculture, forestry and fisheries sectors at the 20th annual Female Entrepreneur Awards (DAFF FEA) at a gala dinner on 30 August 2019;
- (2) acknowledges that this year's theme "celebrating two decades of women's victory in agriculture, forestry and fisheries" pays tribute to the efforts and contribution by women, young females and women with disabilities in the roles they play towards ensuring food security, poverty alleviation, job creation and economic growth in the sector;
- (3) further acknowledges and thanks Total SA who have been sponsoring the awards for the past 20 years;
- (4) congratulates the following winners in the various categories namely:
 - (a) Ms Katrina Nxangani from Free State province for The Best Female Worker;
 - (b) Ms Tholakele Sibiya from KwaZulu-Natal province for Best Subsistence Producer;
 - (c) Ms Happiness Makgamatho from Limpopo province for Top Entrepreneur: Smallholder;
 - (d) Ms Daphne Neethling from Western Cape province for Top Entrepreneur: Processing;
 - (e) Ms Mmathoko Mabula from Limpopo province for Top Entrepreneur: Commercial; and
 - (f) Ms Berene Damons from the Western Cape province for Top Entrepreneur: Export Markets;
- (5) further congratulates recipients of the Minister's special awards for young female which went to Ms Marice Mercuur from the Western Cape and the award for the female entrepreneur with disability in the sector which went to Ms Matebogo Mouwane from Gauteng province;

- (6) applauds the overall winner based on the highest scoring points, Ms Mmathoko Mabula; and
- (7) wishes all the winners much success in their future endeavours.

18. Draft resolution (Ms A Gela): That the House –

- (1) notes that the North West Health department along with Traditional Health Practitioners in the province celebrated the African Traditional Medicine in Huhudi Community Hall in Vryburg on Friday, 30 August 2019;
- (2) acknowledges that Traditional African Medicine week is celebrated annually between 26 and 31 August; and that the week celebrates a holistic discipline involving the use of indigenous herbalism combined with aspects of African spirituality;
- (3) further acknowledges that about 80% of Africa's population relies on traditional medicine for their basic health needs;
- (4) understands that in some cases traditional medicine is the only healthcare service available, accessible and affordable to many people on the continent; and thus, the significant contribution of traditional medicine as a major provider of healthcare services in Africa cannot be underestimated; and
- (5) calls on those who are able to attend these celebrations to take the opportunity to do so.

19. Draft resolution (Mrs V van Dyk): That the House –

- (1) notes that the town of Garies is experiencing constant water problems and that certain areas of the town only had water for nine days during the past month;
- (2) further notes that in July 2018 already, the Democratic Alliance (DA) sent a letter to the MEC for Co-operative Governance and Traditional Affairs in the Northern Cape to point out that the Technical Head of the Kamiesberg Municipality does not hold any appropriate qualifications or background to be in charge of water access to 17 towns in Namaqualand;
- (3) realises that three of the six boreholes serving Garies have completely dried up, and that the water of the other three boreholes can be unsustainably pumped for only 15 minutes at a time;
- (4) further realises that only one truck is serving the hospital and school hostel with water from the neighbouring village of Kheis, which in itself is experiencing water problems;
- (5) further notes that the municipality has not put in place long-term plans to upgrade the outdated infrastructure;

- (6) further realises that the tourism industry and businesses are severely hampered by the lack of access to water, especially now in the flower season; and
- (7) calls on the MEC for Co-operative Governance and Traditional Affairs in the Northern Cape to urgently intervene to free Garies residents from this crisis.

20. Draft resolution (Mrs E N Ntlangwini): That the House –

- (1) notes the escalation of violent attacks on African migrants living in South Africa, particularly in Gauteng province;
- (2) further notes that the escalation of violent attacks against our own African siblings did not just happen unplanned, that it is a carefully orchestrated plan by those in power, with deep hatred for African people, to get African migrants out of the country;
- (3) acknowledges that the attacks on African migrants is just a diversion, and that those who have failed to deliver services, and to eradicate poverty and underdevelopment in South Africa, are the ones who now want to make African migrants scapegoats for their own failures;
- (4) further acknowledges that there can be no freedom and prosperity in South Africa that is exclusively for South Africans only, that our well-being as a country is tied at the hip with the well-being of the rest of the continent;
- (5) calls on all South Africans, particularly political leaders, to desist from attributing the failures of the state to African migrants, and begin to take responsibility for fixing what is wrong in this country; and
- (6) condemns, in the strictest possible manner, the violation of the rights of African people in an African country.

21. Draft resolution (Ms S R van Schalkwyk): That the House –

- (1) notes that 15 September, the Inter-Parliamentary Union (IPU) and parliaments around the world celebrate the International Day of Democracy declared by the United Nations General Assembly in 2007 to promote and uphold the principles of democracy;
- (2) further notes that the choice of 15 September for the International Day of Democracy corresponds to the adoption in September 1997 by the IPU of a Universal Declaration on Democracy;
- (3) understands that this is an opportunity for all governments to respect their citizens' right to active, substantive and meaningful participation in democracy;

- (4) recalls that democracy is built on inclusion, equal treatment and participation — and it is a fundamental building block for peace, sustainable development and human rights;
- (5) recognises that this year's International Day of Democracy is an opportunity to recall that democracy is about people under the theme 'participation';
- (6) acknowledges that this day further inspires constitution-making around the world and contribute to global acceptance of democratic values and principles; and
- (7) calls on all governments to observe and uphold this day as the Day of Democracy.
